
Friends of Fort Trumbull Welcome Author and Artist Norman Brouwer as their May Speaker



On Thursday, May 30, 2019, Norman Brouwer will be the second speaker in our 2019 series- America on the Move- Transportation to Build a Nation. His topic will be Steamboats on Long Island Sound.

Although Robert Fulton built the first commercially successful steamboat in 1807, it was not until after the War of 1812 that steamboats began to ply the waters of Long Island Sound. For 127 years, these vessels provided transportation links between New York, Connecticut, Rhode Island and Massachusetts. In our area, the cities of New London, Norwich and Stonington were the places to go to embark on a trip with these boats that became increasingly elegant as the various lines competed for customers.

With the development of many industries in southern New England, these vessels also carried raw materials to the mills and factories and finished products to New York and Boston. As the competition for passengers and freight increased, these vessels became known as "Floating Palaces", with owners building some of the largest and most majestic steamboats in existence.

Mr. Brouwer, who is a freelance maritime historian living in Mystic, Connecticut, has had a varied and extensive nautical career. He served in the Navy as an enlisted man, graduated from the Maine Maritime Academy, and then became a deck officer in the Merchant Marine. He has served as a volunteer at Mystic Seaport for the past ten years, working on the Mystic Seaport Museum historic photo collections and as a consultant on their marine painting collection. Mr. Brouwer, the author of *Steamboats on Long Island Sound*, will talk on the Steamboat Era on Long Island Sound from early in the 1800s to the final days around World War II.
